Assessment

Grades will reflect an assessment of the mastery of the content and necessary skills and based predominantly on your performance. A varied means of assessment may include but are not limited to:

- Journals:
 - Daily Students are required to have a composition notebook for daily journal entries. A topic will be posted on the board at the beginning of class and a paragraph must be written on the topic. These journals are to remain in the classroom and will be graded weekly. *DO NOT TAKE HOME*
- Essay Questions: ("Free Response" & "Document / Data Based Questions" (DBQ)
 - O Bi-weekly basis (as proficiency improves so will the frequency); you will also be actively grading each other's essays as a means of proficiency via constructive criticism; each essay will have a rubric
- Primary Source Analysis Sheets & Historiography Analysis:
 - O Bi-weekly basis this is a means of clarifying previous readings and introducing new material, in addition to improving the filtering out of bias and recognizing context and point-of-view; an excellent means of summarizing material;
 - O Quarterly analytical & evaluative discussions, at a minimum, of secondary literature relevant to the unit and the themes (*includes critical analysis of audio, video, photography, fine art, texts, maps, etc.*)
- **Presentations:** (group/individual)
 - Weekly ideal for complex issues relating to the given theme, be it: comparisons; mapping; analysis; point-of-view; creating unique presentations; (overhead, projector, computer, poster paper, etc.)
- **Projects:** (group/individual) (audio/video, overhead, computer aided, tangible objects)
 - O Quarterly ideal for larger complex issues of long term change, patterns, and diversity of interpretations; creating unique projects of critical analysis of material to be determined with the consent of the teacher
- Class Discussion: (participation)
 - O Daily consists of individual response and/or Socratic style discussions to stimulate quick-thinking skills and require you to logically and convincingly defend a position while recognizing a diversity of interpretations
- **Mapping skills:** (political, physical, chronological, comparisons, conceptual)
 - O Weekly/Daily to be kept in Red Folder, will consist of various maps intended to clarify & visualize the info presented

• <u>*Project Citizen:*</u> (in lieu of History Fair)

• Year-long Class Project – choose topic to explore in greater detail in class; several steps that will be individually assessed and contribute to your class grade, above and beyond the final project grade. * *Details are forthcoming* *

Grading Policy:

Assessments: 35	5%	{Tests, quizzes, evaluations, etc}

Projects: 20	0%	{Project Citizen Portfolio check point dates, final project grade, presentations, reports, etc}
Participation: 10	0%	{Journals, classroom discussion, group cooperation, etc.}
Homework: 10	.0%	{Research tasks, Current events, completion of assignments, etc.}

**Midterm & final exams* – account for 20% of a student' GPA an all academic classes and could possibly be projects and/or other forms of assessment rather than paper pencil exams.
